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Being struck by moving vehicles on the road between the carpark / campsite and the riverbank	Paddlers, event volunteers, spectators	2	4	The road is a small, quiet road, with a traffic lighted junction at one end, so any traffic on the road should not be travelling fast. Signage will be placed at either end of the section of road to be used by pedestrians to alert drivers that there may be pedestrians in the road. Signage will also be placed at the exit to the campsite/carpark and the exit from the riverbank to remind pedestrians that it is a live road and they should walk at the side and be alert for traffic.

scalds				Kitchen access to be restricted to essential staff only to reduce the number of people at risk.

Catering – food preparation	Event volunteers, paddlers, public	2	2	Catering team to ensure food preparation adheres to best practice regarding food hygiene as far as is practical in a temporary kitchen. (e.g. hand washing facilities/routine, cold storage in cool boxes, separate cooked and uncooked meat).
Catering - Fire	Event volunteers, paddlers, public	1	4	Kitchen to be set up to minimise the risk of fire, and to ensure adequate escape routes from the catering tent.

Slips, Trips, Falls	Paddlers, event volunteers, spectators	3	4	Event information to advise paddlers to beware of uneven surfaces and wet steps. Signage will be provided at the foot of the steps leading to the riverbank reminding users that the riverbank is uneven and may become slippery when wet.
				Ensure paths are kept clear of boats and equipment, boats are not to be left at the top or bottom of the steps leading to/from the riverbank. Event officials to enforce or move boats as appropriate.
				A safety tape barrier will be erected along the edge of the rock ledge by the main rapid along to finish to make everyone aware of the sheer drop into the river.
				Electrical wiring to be run so it does not form a trip hazard.
				Tutti and PA wiring to be run so it does not cause a trip hazard and such that crossing of paths is minimal.

Generator to be located outside and at least 2 m away from any tent or vehicle and be cordoned off with only relevant event staff having access to the area.
				The generator should not be refueled whilst running; it must be switched off before any refueling can take place.
Electrical safety - electrocution / overload	Event volunteers	1	3	Visual inspection of wiring prior to and during use and remove defective leads from use until they can be repaired.
				Ensure sufficient extension leads are used to avoid overloading sockets.
				Extension leads to be protected by RCD's / surge protection.
				Appropriate outdoor leads / connections to be used for outdoor wiring (e.g. caravan/camping leads).
First Aid Provision	All	3	3	At least one qualified event First Aider will be appointed for the slalom event (ideally 2 people).
				First Aid Kit kept in control Check prior to the event. Organiser to advise of any equipment used.

				Practice and race runs to be organized so there are adequate gaps between paddlers
				Organiser to ensure that required / relevant safety notices are displayed at race control and if required by the river access and by finish.
