	Holme Pierrepont White Water Course, Adbolton Ln, Holme Pierrepont, Nottingham NG12 2LU
Location Details	The Dalek race is run on the section of water after the main Wild Water course which is mainly flat water but with a considerable flow. There is parking and public access to the site, with footpaths running the length of the course. The course will be closed to other paddlers during competition. The location is part of a country park and there are often members of the public on the banks of the course.

Safety Plan	Safety cover will be provided. It is planned to have on the bank safety cover with people that have completed the Stadium Safety course. It is also a requirement in the WWR racing rules that at least 2 racers remain at the finish until the next paddler completes the course. The event will also be supported by competent, experienced athletes both on and off the water. The Dalek course has complete visibility from any point, however there will be a person posted near to the blocks at the end of the course. The nominated first aider is Louise Maloney
